U.S. Open Qualifier: A Great Falls Affair.....

There is an old expression that the more things change, the more they stay the same. That couldn't be more true than what happened at the US Open Qualifier conducted February 28 & March 1 in Helena. So what really did change and what stayed the same?

First of all, the champions were different than in 2008. Mike Christensen and Doris Kimmerle, both from Great Falls, were the men's and women's respective winners replacing Tony Woodward (Helena) and Julie Redfern (Billings) from last year. Another change from last year (and this was a good one) was an increase in women's entries from 18 to 34. Also in the change category, of the top 24 men this year, only eight of them made the cut a year ago. This year's top 24 men sported a lot newer and younger look.

What stayed the same? The men's entries were 106 compared to 105 in 2008, which only signifies another wonderful job done by Sleeping Giant Lanes owner, Michelle Anderson. The women's top 16 had eight the same as last year (50%). Both of last year's winners were in the hunt this year with Woodward (16th) and Redfern (10th). Kimmerle won this event before in 2007. Helena's John Brodersen continued his mastery in this event placing 3rd after getting 2nd in 2008 as well as several first place finishes in the past. And the scoring conditions were as tough as ever, symbolic of what should be contested on in a US Open tournament.

State Tournaments Coming to Anaconda, Billings, Missoula and Butte.

Some go for the fun. Some go for the competition. Some go because of tradition and some go just because it is there. But regardless the reason, state tournaments are a huge and integral part of bowling in Montana. If you are planning a road trip to one of these tournaments, here is some helpful information.

It all starts with the Montana USBC Open state tournament. This year's event is being held in Anaconda and runs for eight big weekends starting March 28th. The team event is scheduled for Cedar Park Lanes and the doubles & singles will be at Copper City Bowl. Even though Easter is the second weekend in April, it will not interfere with any state tournament scheduling. The Open will run for eight consecutive weekends ending May 17th. The reason for eight weekends this year (as opposed to six in 2008) is because it is being held in much smaller bowling centers than what was available in Missoula last year. Entries close on May 1, 2009. Ranie Kelly is the tournament director.

The 2009 Women's State tournament starts on April 18th and runs for five weekends ending May 17th. It will be held in Billings this year with the team event scheduled for Sunset Bowl and the doubles & singles at Fireside Lanes. Some Friday night shifts are available this year on May 1, 8, & 15. There are still three divisions this year, but some changes were made to tweak the average limits with the A division now starting at 165 and the C division for 145 and lower averages. An optional scratch team event has been added to both the Women's and the Open tournaments this year. Dale Matthaes is the tournament director and is being assisted by Bert Stiles. Entries close April 27, 2009.

The Montana USBC Youth state tournament will be held on two big weekends starting April 18th and ending April 26th. It is scheduled for Missoula with the team event at Five Valleys Center and the doubles & singles at Westside Lanes. The entry deadline is March 15, 2009. The tournament director is Teri Hodges.

The Pepsi YBC state finals is being held April 3-5, 2009 at Star Lanes in Butte. This event has undergone more major changes even from last year. There will no longer be a national Pepsi Finals. However, the top two finishers in the scratch divisions will all receive a paid entry into the national Junior Gold tournament. Scholarships will still be awarded at all levels, but bowlers in the handicap divisions will no longer have the ability to advance to the national level. Jane Crowder is the tournament director.

The 2009 High School State Championships will be held at Star Lanes in Butte on May 3. This is a one-day event this year. Tom Brendgord is the tournament manager. There are two qualifying shifts with entries allowed up to the start of the final shift (11:30 am) May 3rd.

Billings Bowler Records Rare Ambidextrous 300s

As bowlers we know that a perfect 300 is something that we all strive for, yet few ever attain. So one can only imagine the uniqueness of rolling sanctioned 300 games with each hand. 24-year old Jason Link of Billings accomplished just that on January 23, 2009 while bowling in his left-handed league at Fireside Lanes. Jason had rolled a right-handed 300 game eleven months previously in February 2008 in a league also at Fireside Lanes.

Although considered highly unusual, the USBC actually recognized the first such happening by Neil Bayes of St. Louis when he rolled a 300 in 1963 (right-handed) and another one in 1970 (left-handed). Although the USBC does not keep track of ambidextrous 300s, some media reports nationally put the total to date at around 100, which is a lot more than what I would have ever thought.

Adding to this oddity is the fact that another Billings bowler, Craig Schweigert, has not only also rolled right and left-handed 300s, but also right and left-handed 800 series. Craig did his first 300 left-handed in Billings in the late 1990's and then followed with a right-handed one in Spokane a few years later.

Maybe this isn't so hard to do after all!!

It starts with a few committee meetings on Friday, March 27th and ends with the Annual Delegate Meeting and MUSBC election on Sunday, March 29th. In between there will be a state Hall of Fame banquet on Friday night, and a Montana USBC board of directors meeting plus Opening Ceremonies for the Open State tournament on Saturday morning. This will all happen at the Elks Club and Country Club in Anaconda except for Opening Ceremonies scheduled for Cedar Park Lanes on Saturday.

The Hall of Fame Dinner starts at 6pm Friday at the Anaconda Country Club with cocktail hour. Dinner will be served at 7pm. Tickets cost \$24. Tickets can be obtained from Ranie Kelly or Bert Stiles 667-2258, email: fa-talbert@mtintouch.net. The inductees are Dolores Atchison (Butte), Sandi Beaudette (Anaconda) and Robert & Alice Nash (Thompson Falls), who are being inducted into the Pioneer division.

The Delegate Meeting will start at 9 am on Sunday at the Elks Club. Among other business, the delegates will elect new board members and some officers totaling about half of the board. Prior to the election the delegates will vote on 25 to 30 by-law changes. Most of these changes are very straight-forward. The legislative committee feels that probably #1 thru #25 can be voted on in a single motion. All of them can be viewed on the MUSBC tab at bowlmontana.com.

On My Mind.....

State Tournaments & High School Bowling

Bowling Centers & State Tournaments

Almost two years ago in this column I wrote an article titled "Where Have All The Centers Gone?" In it I mentioned the closing of five major centers totaling 88 Lanes and the potential of many more on the horizon. I also mentioned how these closings are affecting state tournaments



The host city for our major state tournaments is determined by the number of lanes in that city. Specifically, there must be at least 30 lanes or more. That is why Helena, Bozeman and Kalispell are no longer eligible to host. Country Lanes (Bozeman) & Capital City Bowl (Helena) sold, but not as bowling centers and Skyline Bowl (Kalispell) burned down. The Montana USBC has done an admirable job of adapting to the five remaining cities (Anaconda, Billings, Butte, Great Falls and Missoula), but what will they do if and when they start to fall below the 30 lane minimum? And believe me when I say that no city, except maybe Missoula, is safe in today's economic climate.

The Montana USBC tournament committee will soon have to consider contingencies for their state tournaments, for when these centers start to fall, it is usually with no forewarning. Is their system broke now? Probably not. How many available cities do they need to get down to before it is too few? That hasn't been determined yet. Can changes be implemented now that will improve this deteriorating situation? Maybe, but only for open-minded bowlers who appreciate thinking outside the box and don't mind seeing change.

Here are some changes that are certainly worth considering. 1) Reduce the team size to 4 players in the Open. The women are already doing that. 2) Consider lowering the number of lanes in a city to 24 and allow more than two centers to reach that minimum. 3) If a single 24-lane center is used for the entire tourney, designate every shift as both a team shift and a doubles & singles shift. That can easily be done by allocating 8 or 10 lanes for team and 14 or 16 for D & S putting no more than two doubles teams to a pair of lanes. Also, require Friday night shifts. 4) Consider allowing combinations of cities within 40 miles of each other, such as, Bozeman & Livingston, or Whitefish & Bigfork.

These are attractive alternatives that need to be given some thought. There are some downsides to all of them, but there are also many upsides. Our system may not be broke, but it is definitely showing signs of wear. State tournament entries have dropped off immensely in the last ten years. Maybe it is time to do something about it. Talk to your MUSBC rep if you agree.

2009 High School State Bowling Championships

High school bowlers, mark Sunday, May 3rd on your calendar. That is the day I will be conducting the annual state high school bowling championships at Star Lanes in Butte. Last year, we changed the format to a team qualifying round with the top 8 boys and top 8 girls teams advancing to a double elimination final. This year it is changing to a one-day event with two qualifying shifts (9 am & 11:30 am) to allow up to 48 teams. Re-entries are not allowed, but multiple teams from the same school are allowed. Tucker Schaff has bowled two perfect games so far this season. Tucker is a youth bowler in the Greater Yellowstone Valley USBC Association. NATIONAL NEWS

Major Changes Coming to Youth Program

The USBC Board of Directors has approved several major changes to USBC Youth programs effective for the 2009-10 season. The reason for the changes is to boost youth membership in certified leagues and to provide a more efficient and rewarding system for them. Key changes to the youth program include:

1. Bowling centers will have the option to directly process memberships, averages and awards to USBC. In many areas, local associations will continue this function; however, bowling centers will be able to make the choice to take sole responsibility or continue to work through local associations for Youth processing.

2. A USBC Youth Basic Membership (\$5.00) option has been added for youths in leagues that meet for 12 or fewer sessions. The USBC Standard Membership (\$17) and Junior Gold Membership (\$30) remain unchanged. For the Junior Gold program, the new average requirement for girls has been adjusted to 150; the boys will remain at 175.

3. The youth awards program will undergo significant changes in an effort to better match awards to the skill level of the youth bowler. Included will be special awards for ages 12 and under plus a return of the 300 game and 800 series rings.

4. The age requirement will be changing. USBC Youth memberships will be available to bowlers who have not reached their 20th birthday on or before August 1st of the current bowling season.

These changes are expected to make local USBC associations that are already strong even stronger. At the same time this gives bowling proprietors a way to partner with USBC directly to grow their youth participation.

If You Bowl The USBC Women's National Championships, You Might Want To Read This!

The USBC Women's Championships will undergo some major changes in 2010 beginning with the building in which it will be contested. Instead of an existing bowling center, it will be held in a specially constructed arena setting in El Paso, Texas.

Although the physical setting is something new in a non-Reno year, this change pales in comparison to the other changes that the Championships entrants will face. The Women's Championships has undergone several divisional changes in its history, but has always been based on bowlers' actual score. The current format being contested this year in Reno features five average-based divisions, but the final standings are still determined by scratch scores.

That will all change in 2010 when three average-based divisions will be used and all of them will be contested using 100% handicap. The Diamond Division will be made up of bowlers with averages of 180 and higher with handicap based on 220. The Ruby Division matches bowlers with averages from 150-179 using handicap based on 180. The Sapphire Division is for bowlers with an average of 149 and below with handicap based on 150. Optional scratch prize funds will be available and scratch titles will still be offered in team, doubles, singles and all-events.

According to Jack Mordini, USBC Vice President of Tournaments and Events, based on research, these changes are what the bowlers in this event want.

I guess that only time will tell. Although many of these changes make a lot of sense, collectively they are huge. Some are bound to meet with some resistance. My guess is that the Diamond Division will draw the most dissension.
